The South's New Racial Politics presents an original thesis about how blacks and whites in today's South engage in a politics that is qualitatively different from the past. Now, politicians of the two races practice an open, sophisticated, biracial game that, arguably, means progress; but it also can bring out old-fashioned, cynical, and racist Southern ways. The lesson to be learned from this interpretative analysis is that the Southern political system, while still constrained by racial problems, is more functional than ever before. Stealth Reconstruction: The Untold Story of Southern Politics and History (Spring 2010)

America seems to have little sense of how the civil rights movement actually played into Southern politics over the remainder of the twentieth century.

The common vision is a monolithic struggle between heroes and villains, depicted literally and figuratively in black and white.

Unfortunately, this conception provides incomplete explanation for subsequent progress in the Southern political system.

This book (by Glen Browder in collaboration with Artemesia Stanberry) reveals that, amid all the heroic history of that time, there is a fascinating story of “stealth reconstruction”—i.e., the unheroic, quiet, practical, biracial work of some white politicians and black leaders, a story untold and unknown until now.
